

If mechanical brakes are in good condition, cast iron drums are used and there is no slack in the rods and pins, mechanical brakes are just a efficient.



# Model A Adventures — The Day We Learned About Spare Parts

Shortly after I got my driver's license, my dad and I were driving my Model A after having done some work on it. He said: "Do you hear that sound? That's the rear end singing." I was new to car mechanics and really didn't understand how a singing rear end would impact my life, except that maybe the sound would get louder and it would be harder to have a conversation while driving around.

Dad said we needed to find another one to avoid the expense and craftsmanship required to set up new gears and bearings for the one in the car. In the mid '60s, we could still find ads in the local newspaper for Model A parts. Some guy in Van Nuys had two differentials for sale. We went over there and picked out the one we thought was the best and paid him \$30 for it.

When we got home, we jacked up the car and started removing the old axle. We got the new one nearly installed when my dad discovered that it had been taken apart before and reassembled with the drain holes on the top of the banjo.

"You're not going to be able to drain and fill it like that." He said. "But it's symmetrical, so we can take it back out, flip it over, and rotate the axle housings a halfturn to put the spring hangers back on the top." By the time we got it halfway back in the car, it was dark and time to quit. The following Monday, I asked my friends if they'd help me finish buttoning up the project. It didn't take us long and I was eager to find out if this new axle was quieter than the old one.

I started the car, put it in reverse and twisted myself around so I could see to back out. The car went forward. I tried once more and the car again went forward. Deeply puzzled, I tried first gear and the car backed up. Now I panicked. I tried second and high and the car went in reverse in both selections.

> I was beside myself wondering what I had done to my Model A. My pals were as unable to explain the phenomenon as me, but it was my car and I was experiencing the hyperventilation. I got on the phone to my dad and in a breaking voice told him what had happened.

I have three speeds in reverse and one speed forward. I didn't even touch the transmission! What's wrong with my car?"

He thought for a minute and began to laugh. I didn't think it was funny. "When we flipped it over, the ring gear ended up on the wrong side of the pinion. You'll have to take it apart again, pull the guts out from the right side and put them back in on the left."

I went out and told my friends what we had to do. But before we started, we took it out on the street and drove it backwards through all three gears just to say we did it.



# Electrical Repairs on the Model A – Finding A Bad Wire




At our recent Garage Days event, we worked together on Tony's 1928 Phaeton to solve an electrical short and brighten the headlights on his car. Safety is very important and correcting problems is a must-do on any car with a compromised lighting system.

We used a voltmeter to find the source of his short. This is wiser than turning on the light switch and waiting for something to smoke so as to find the location of the problem. By checking continuity to ground on each of the wires, we found the short in his tail light. There should not be any continuity to ground in a wire going to a bulb.

To use the voltmeter for this test, we set the selector to Ohms, represented by the Greek letter Omega -  $\Omega$ . By disconnecting the wiring harness from the switch at the end of the steering column, we had access to all the wire ends. By using a wiring diagram, we saw which colored wire goes to which light bulb. Here's how to do it:

- 1. Place one test lead anywhere on the chassis of the car or engine to get a good ground connection and the other test lead on the wire end you want to check.
- 2. If the reading is about 6 Ohms, that's normal for a functioning circuit with a good light bulb in it.
- 3. If the reading is 0, then there is no short but an "open" circuit; if the wire goes to a light bulb, that bulb may be burned out.
- 4. If the reading is about .02 Ohms, you've found the shorted wire.







# Breaking News... FROM NEWSPAPERS OF THE MODEL A ERA



June 12, 1928 — Born Richard Morton Sherman; he became a famous songwriter and music director and wrote movie music with his brother Robert Bernard Sherman.

You may not know their names, but you know their songs. Some of the Sherman Brothers' best-known writing includes the songs from *Mary Poppins, Bedknobs and Broomsticks, The Jungle Book, Winnie the Pooh, Chitty Chitty Bang Bang, The Slipper and the Rose,* and the Disney theme park song "It's a Small World (After All)".

June 30, 1929 — 33rd US Golf Open: Bobby Jones shoots a 294 at Winged Foot CC NY. Jones won his third U.S. Open title here in a 36-hole playoff, besting Al Espinosa by

23 strokes on the West Course He won his fourth U.S. Open in 1930 and the grand slam. He was the most successful amateur golfer ever to compete on a national and international level. He retired at age 28.



June 7, 1930 — Respecting Negro demands, The New York Times agrees to capitalize the n in "Negro." W. E. De Bois and other activists were demanding the work negro be capitalized. He targeted local and national newspapers. He viewed it as



disrespect and overtly racist. One editor of a Georgia newspaper refused saying he would never capitalize the letter "n" because it might lead to "social equality."

June 9, 1931 — Robert Goddard patients the first rocket powered aircraft. In 1899 as a child his was sent into a cherry tree to trim the branches, instead, he started daydreaming. In his journal he wrote:

"It was one of the quiet, colorful afternoons of sheer beauty which we have in October in New England, and as I looked toward the fields at the east, I imagined how wonderful it would be to make some device which had even the possibility of ascending to Mars..."


