ALTON'S JALOPY!

Dear Model A'ers,

School is out and the summer season is here, hurray. A Model A can be driven in all seasons, but summer is best. Everyone loves to see an old car. Let's do our best this year to give them something to look at, all over Utah & Sanpete Counties!

June is also Father's Day, where we honor our fathers. I guess we could say that our car's father was Henry Ford. The best way that we can honor him is to drive, drive, drive them. In order to help you with that, we have a number of upcoming great activities for you to support and have a good time. Check the upcoming events in this issue.

One of the great things about our Model A club since its inception is that we slowly continue to grow. It is wonderful to welcome and get to know new people that share our love of the Model A.

I recently was given an article written by my older cousin about his dad's Model A. It was affectionately given the name "Alton's Jalopy". My uncle's name was Alton Stringham of Manti, Utah.

He started with a 1929 Model A pickup. He removed the cab, added a covered wagon bow and made a canvas that could be quickly installed in case of rainy weather. He also added a tag axle with wheels and lengthened the pickup bed for heavier loads, etc. In the winter or with very muddy roads, he made a set of chains that could revolve around both sets of rear wheels similar to a half-track. This provided the extra traction to go almost anywhere in any kind of weather.

Another addition he fabricated was a pulley that was held on with the wheel lug nuts. He would back up to a tree, jack up *continued on page 22*

Howard Eckstein recapped the very successful WPA tour from last month where 20 cars participated. He highlighted great opportunities we had to take pictures of our cars in front of many historic structures and the attention it attracted. He also described some of the lessons learned about moving large crowds of people, both club members as well as spectators. Because of this the board met to discuss new touring guidelines. We appreciate Howard's efforts making this trip possible. The travel guide was a wonderful resource.

Clyde Munson, our Activities Chairman, read the guidelines that the club members are to follow during tours and other club activities. These guidelines will help make the activities more enjoyable for all involved. Please follow this protocol. The guidelines will also be posted on our club's webpage as well as passed out in the next club meeting. Please read the touring protocol in Touring/Activity Guidelines on the following page.

2017 Club Goals:

President Carlson has outlined four goals he would like us to strive toward:

- 1. Get all club member's cars running and on the road before the end of June.
- 2. Have an activity where everyone's car is in a club photograph.
- Develop a 90th anniversary/celebration gift for the Model A's as they each turn 90 years old.

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Utah Valley Model A Club Touring/Activity Guidelines

1) Prior to each tour, a wagon master will be chosen. We ask that each tour participant provide a cell # to the wagon master.

2) The wagon master will select the lead and tail cars for each leg of the tour.

3) If you choose to leave in the middle of a tour we ask that you notify the wagon master.

4) We ask that tour participants arrive on time ready for the tour (gas full, oil checked, bags packed, pets fed, snacks eaten, bladders emptied). We will leave on time to ensure we stay on schedule.

5) If a tour participant suffers a breakdown on the way to a tour they should call the wagon master or other tour member to notify the group (depending on circumstance, we will wait).

6) If a tour member suffers a breakdown during the tour, all members should stop (provided it is safe to do so and await instruction from the wagon master). If it is not safe to stop, the lead car should travel to the next safe location and stop and await direction from the wagon master.

7) All cars should attempt to maintain a 4-5 car length space from the car ahead.

8) Tours in town will travel at posted speed limits, highway tours will travel at 40-45 mph

9) We ask that members use the buddy system. Watch your rearview mirror and turn on your headlights and pull over if the car behind you pulls over (w/ lights on) (breakdown).

10) Members wishing to join the tour but who are driving modern cars are asked to follow behind all Model As (there are two reasons for this; it allows the model A drivers to more easily see each other and in case of a breakdown a modern car can catch up to the lead car and notify them of problems). We ask that members in modern cars not pass unless to take photos (notify the wagon master prior to the start of the leg of the tour if you will be passing for photos).

11) Please be patient with other tour members (driving 80 year old cars in large groups leads to unexpected situations (breakdowns, photo ops, or friendly but talkative onlookers can cause delays; please plan for the unexpected).

12) Any complaints about the tour timing, weather, scenery, route, or any other issues should be brought to the wagon master. The member lodging the complaint will be required to be the wagon master for the next tour.

one night in Delta, two in Ely and one in Wendover. More details to follow.



RICHARD AND JUDY JUDD

I was born in Salt Lake City and lived there until I was eight-years-old, after which my family moved to Bountiful, where I lived until I joined the service.

I bought my first car, an MGB hard top, just two weeks out of high school with money I earned working at a Pepsi bottling plant. In those days their major product was Hires Root Beer rather than Pepsi.

That fall I followed in the footsteps of my father and uncle and joined the Marine Corps where I served for four years. Though my father told me that if I joined the service, to pick one that offered a bed to sleep in, I joined the Marines! I felt it was my turn to serve. The Marines had landed at China Beach just prior to my enlistment.

I left my car at my father's house. I had put 20% down on the car, and made payments for six months, but in those days, the longest you could borrow money on a used car was 24 months. I didn't get my first check from the military for 10 weeks, so I asked my father to sell the car. To this day I don't know if I lost or made money on the sale.

After boot camp and infantry training, I was sent to Camp Lejeune in North Carolina for ten months as part of the 8th Battalion.



I was constantly requesting orders to be sent to Vietnam. Finely I received orders to serve either in the State Department or Vietnam. Can you guess which one I chose? Yup, I was off the next week to Jungle War School then on to Vietnam. After serving for 13 months, including Tera, I was able to go home. If you volunteered to extend your service for six months, they gave you 30 days leave, so home I went.



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After being home for three days, I bought a 1968, 327 Camaro. After being home for four days, I got engaged to my wife, whom I had met while on R&R in Hawaii that same year. We were married six months



e next week to to Camp Pendleton.



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By now, my Camaro had around 700 miles on it, so I traded it in for a 1969 Austin Healy convertible to ride the freeway with three other Marines and their wives, who had sports cars. It w a s a b a d m o v e



economically, but sure was fun in the sun!



After a year home working for Bountiful Light & Power, my wife, Judy, became pregnant, so it was bye-bye sports car. Either that or I had to find a big shoe horn for Judy.

We had a 1969 four-door Buick and my favorite, a 49 Studebaker pick-up. The pickup had a broken heater,

non-working wipers and needed to be started by shorting the starter motor. I drove it everywhere come hell or high water. Finally, I sold it to a coworker and purchased a 1971 Ford 150.

I took a job in Nephi City for six years. By then we had a son and daughter. Coming from a house of nine children, two children were plenty. I then took a job as Chief Operating Officer / General Manager of Utah Municipal Power Agency for 22 years.



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Golden Wrench Award - Installing a New Top

Eight years ago I purchased a 1928 Model A Sport Coupe. It had been stored and neglected for forty years. Still, I bought it. The top on this Model A was so badly rotted through, I had to tear it off and discard it. Nothing but the wire supports was salvageable.

Many of the wood frame pieces were also rotten. To save some money, I manufactured my own wood ribs and the frames, the ones around the body behind the passenger compartment. I then installed them. Happily I found they fit very nicely.

I ordered a top kit from LeBaron Bonney and with less than full confidence, I began installing it. With the included instructions I was able to mount the three support strips, then I laid the padding over them. I threw the pre-sewn, fabric top over it all. By tacking and pulling and tacking some more I got the top secured to my wood framing. I have never done anything like this before, and still got what I feel is a decent job, satisfactory to me and my sweet wife.

I did the same thing with my rumble seat covers. The car originally had a trunk. With some special parts, a lot of effort and help from my sweet wife, I converted it to a rumble seat condition. I ordered the springs and a cover kit from the same company as my top. I had no idea how to install the hog rings, but soon learned. First the burlap was cut and ringed onto the springs, then the batting was trimmed to size. Finally the heavy Naugahyde material was tacked on, trimmed, stretched and hog ringed. I have to give a lot of credit to the kit manufacturer for the success we realized.




I came across one of these issues recently that concerned me slightly. I had one wheel on my coupe that had a couple of cracks that appeared in the rim. I will be honest, I have been driving it with these cracks for years and thousands of miles and they never grew, so I figured I would switch the rim out eventually. I finally decided to do this last summer. When I pulled this wheel off, I saw something that scared me. There were cracks emanating from the lug holes!!!!

I have not taken the time yet to address my warranty concerns with Ford, but I will. Until then, I decided it would be a good idea to inspect all of my other wheels and I am happy to say they are all fine and have no cracks. I feel much better that I took the time to look. I have never heard of a rim failure causing an accident, but I wouldn't want to be the first. So, if I were you, I would inspect the wheels.


