
Howard and Gemma attended the National Awards Banquet where Howard received another Bill Reeder Award. We have a celebrity in our midst. Congratulations Howard!

2017 MAFCA National Awards Banquet

Once a year the Model A Ford Club of America holds an annual awards banquet where awards for website, newsletter and *The Restorer* literary awards are presented. It is also at this meeting that the following year's National Board officers are announced.

This year the event was held on November 29th through December 2nd in Oklahoma City. During the affair, attendees can sign up to participate in bus tours to various attractions arranged for by the local chapter in the host city.

Howard and Gemma Eckstein attended this event because Howard was the recipient of the Bill Reeder Award. This is for recognition of his technical article "Model A Brake Drums" printed in the November/December 2016 issue of *The Restorer* chosen by the past presidents of MAFCA. This year there were 51 technical articles of which 16 qualified for consideration.

To qualify, an article must be over 500 words; the subject has not been covered before; is clearly written and illustrated; it gives the average restorer enough information to repeat the process; is common to all Model A owners rather than to a particular body style. The Bill Reeder Literary Award is considered the Premier MAFCA Literary Award.

In the past few years, Greg and Robert Mack have received national awards from MAFCA for our newsletter the *Motormeter* and our website, *utahvalleymodelaclub.org*, both of which have raised the bar on the quality of other chapters' publications.

During these events, a hospitality room is set up where participants can chew the fat with members from across the country and chomp down on homemade goodies prepared by the host club. This is open the whole week, so we did our best to help them to not have leftovers by the end of it all.





Our first bus tour was to the Early Wheels Museum. This is a private collection owned by Ted Davis, which includes many race cars that are over 100 years old. He has a complete workshop for woodworking and a machine shop for reproducing parts for the rare cars in his collection.


After a nice lunch at a steakhouse, we were back on the bus to the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum. Here is displayed the famous and majestic sculpture "The End of the Trail" by James Earle Fraser. There were many exhibits of the cowboy business such as branding irons and clothing. Also on display were old buildings depicting 19th century western life.

Our next stop was a visit to the largest series of bronze statuary in the world. It consists of 47 individual statues spanning a distance of 365 feet. They are the work of artist Paul Moore, cast in dark bronze which depict the first Oklahoma Territory Land Run on April 22, 1889.

Before the cannon marked the beginning of the run at high noon that day, the government had marked off plots on over 2 million acres of farm and city lands that were free for the taking. Over 50,000 people lined up along the border waiting for the signal to run and stake a claim. This was done by taking a flag to a plot and placing it on the land and removing the government marker to take it to the land office for recording. Of course, someone in that party stayed on that plot to defend it from others who would try to claim it.

Hopeful settlers rushed in one huge chaotic dash, running over each other, breaking out in fights and crushing others to death. The lands claimed nearest the starting line were run over by the galloping herds of flying wagons, falling horses and the seemingly endless wild-eyed cavalcade of greed-stricken humanity.

Cheaters, some of whom were the government surveyors themselves, went out days and hours before the rush and squatted on choice areas; these are known as the "Sooners." The bus driver who took us out to the





monument said he was a descendent of one of the families who claimed land that day.

The following day was not as busy with sightseeing as it was time for the seminars. The first one was about Route 66 and was presented by Jim Ross, one of the members of the Route 66 Preservation Society. Next was a seminar put on by Jim Spawn that covered the business history of one Fred Jones. He was an important entrepreneur who brought the Ford Dealership to Oklahoma. The last seminar was presented by Ron Kelley who is a Model A engine rebuilder in Texas. He specializes in high performance Model A engines and brought a wealth of knowledge with him.

Adjacent to the hotel and on the south of downtown is the district called Bricktown. It is an area of old brick buildings that have been revitalized in a huge urban redevelopment program. It's filled with stores, restaurants, hotels, the National Banjo Museum, which we had to peek in and see, and the Oklahoma Dodgers ballpark which is the AAA farm club for the Los Angeles Dodgers. In Bricktown is a short riverwalk with water taxis that are really open-air excursion boats that ply the man-made canal.



On the last day we e boarded a city bus that took us to the Oklahoma City Memorial, which is on the property where once stood the Alfred P. Murrah






Federal Building that was destroyed by a truck bomb on April 19, 1995. The interpretive displays were very well done and sent everyone home in a somber mood. On the footprint of the building is now a grass field covered with empty chairs that denote one of the 168 people who lost their lives that day. Small chairs represent the children who died there. One of the rooms of the former Journal Record Building, which stands across the street from the erstwhile federal building, was left as it was after the blast, where we could see the complete chaos of the damaged building.

At last the time came for the banquet. It's fun to chat with new friends made during the previous days while enjoying a slide show and eating a fancy dinner. The award presentations came next and among them, Howard was introduced as "Professor Howard" in a tongue-incheek reference made by Doug Clayton, the MAFCA publications director. It was pointed out that Howard is a repeat recipient of the Bill Reeder Award.

As you can see, the National Awards Banquet is more than just an evening out to get an award. It's really a fun vacation with a dinner attached. Hobnobbing with the MAFCA board officers is just like hanging out with our own chapter members. Each of them works hard to make MAFCA a first-class operation.

Being able to represent the Utah Valley Model A Club on the national scene is a cool thing to do. We trade stories of activities we've done that have worked well. A couple from California was very interested in our Vintage Iron Chef events.

One of the frequent topics of discussion was the upcoming National Tour based in Kanab, Utah in 2019. According to the board members I spoke with, they are expecting 500 cars. Ours will be in there with the rest of them.

Model A Spark Rod Movement

The spark control rod on the Model A is somewhat misunderstood. Today modern cars have computers that control the spark setting automatically. Before the computer, vacuum and centrifugal weights were used both individually and together to advance the spark. The Model A relies on the driver to control the spark advance. One must know why there is a spark control on cars.

Here is a quick lesson on four stroke gasoline engines.

- (l) **Intake** The piston moves down creating a vacuum. The intake valve opens allowing the air/fuel mixture into the cylinder.
- (2) **Compression** The air/fuel mixture is compressed as the piston travels upward with both valves closed.
- (3) **Power** The air/fuel mixture explodes forcing the piston downward with both valves closed. This is where the energy in the engine is created. This is also what the spark rod controls. Ideally the full force of the explosion needs to be pushing on a piston traveling in a downward direction. If not you could get backfiring or excessive pressure on the top of the piston, rings, rod bearings and even the crankshaft bearings. So you want the spark timed to the downward direction.
- (4) **Exhaust** The piston moves upward with the exhaust valve open forcing the burnt gases out of the combustion chamber. Here are some points to consider when advancing or retarding the spark control lever:
- A cold engine has slow combustion so more spark advance is needed.
- A hot engine the combustion is faster so less spark advance is needed.
- In a stock bore the combustion is faster (smaller space) so less spark advance is needed.

- In a large bore the combustion is slower (larger space) so more spark advance is needed.
- A stock cylinder head the combustion is slower (larger space) so more spark advance is needed.
- A high compression head 5.5 or 6.0 combustion is faster (smaller space) so less spark advance is needed.
- At low speeds combustion is slower so less spark advance is needed.
- At high speeds the combustion is faster so more spark advance is needed.
- Heavy loads the combustion is faster so more spark advance is needed.
- Old gasoline has lower volatility so combustion is slower and more spark advance is needed.
- New fresh gasoline has high volatility so combustion is faster and less spark advance is needed.
- If the spark lever is retarded too much it will cause the engine to overheat.
- If the spark lever is advanced too much it will cause ignition knock. Fuel ignition too soon.
- Climbing steep hills or grades less spark advance is needed.
- Fully retard the spark lever when starting a cold engine.
- Advance the spark lever 2 notches when starting a warm engine.
- Fully retard the spark lever when setting the carburetor idling adjustment.
- For normal driving the spark lever should be ½ to ¾ the way down the quadrant. High speeds or flat driving the spark lever can be 7/8 to the full range of the quadrant, but as soon as hills arrive the spark lever must be retarded some to prevent power loss and ignition knocking.

In conclusion, there are many factors that affect the spark control setting on the Model A. They are also interrelated. Do not be afraid to experiment with the spark control setting. You might discover more power and less overheating! Listen to your Model A, they usually tell you if something is not quite right.

The 2018 Convention, to be held in Reno, NV, is now accepting registrations. For more information and registration forms, visit this link: 2018 MAFCA Convention.




