

June 15th Orem Summerfest activities: Saturday



The Munson's



Jenn, Clyde, Nevin and Ian in Capitol Reef National Park

Jenn is from Orem and Clyde grew up in Ely, Nevada and they met at SUU in Cedar City. They have been married for 16 years. They have 2 boys Nevin (14) and Ian (11). Jenn enjoys writing and traveling and has made a goal of traveling to Japan as soon as she can. Clyde obviously likes working and driving old cars and doing woodworking projects.

The old car hobby has slowly grown on Jenn it has been a part of Clyde's life since as far back as he can remember. Back in the sixties Clyde's Grandfather had part ownership in a Dodge dealership which led to the acquisition of 5 1924-1926 Dodge Brothers cars.

Years later Clyde's Dad, Ron, made a decision. He was tired of trailering his Dodge when everybody else drove their Model A's and he was tired of looking at all black cars. He purchased a 1931 Slant windshield sedan and began restoring it. It was painted turquoise, the same color as his 1979 Lincoln Continental, and thus the car became known as Abe.

In 1986 he bought a 1931 Coupe for Clyde. The previous owners had named the car Henry and so it is still Henry today (isn't it considered bad luck to rename a boat, cars must be the same.) The car was restored and painted Rally Green not a correct color but it is one of kind.



From the end of his 6th grade year until he graduated from High School, Clyde worked at a mechanic shop sweeping and cleaning. The shop was owned by Wally Birch, a WWII vet and Model A owner. Wally was always able to answer questions Clyde had as he was working on his cars and taught him a lot. Several

years later when people would have questions about the Model A's Wally would say "Ask Clyde, He knows more than I do." It wasn't true but Clyde enjoyed the fact that Wally had confidence in him. Wally passed away 2 years ago and Clyde misses his friend and mentor.

Clyde and Ron also have a '29 roadster that was a rescued hot rod project so it is a rough restoration but it provided a fun tour car for Clyde and his friends during his high school days. A trip to Tonapah in the roadster was the only time Clyde had a car trailered home and a trip to Wells and Wendover without wipers and side-curtains provided an experience in inclement weather that proved that the front seat of a Model A will hold about 30 gallons of rain water.

Just before Clyde left for college Henry was ready for touring and a few short trips were made but the fun was put on hold for a bit while Clyde focused on education. In 1995 Jenn knocked Clyde off his feet (literally) and she was introduced to Henry. Jenn attended a few car club activities with Clyde, during one of the activities Jenn learned to drive a Model A (while blindfolded). Jenn and Clyde made a couple trips from Ely to Cedar City and one trip to Mesquite. Tech Tips

Radiator Flush

Pikes Peak Model A Club

Many members of the Pikes Peak Model A Club recommend the use of distilled white vinegar to clean out the gunk, grease and rust that accumulates through-out the year. Every spring they will drain the water and/or antifreeze from the car and fill



it with three gallons of distilled white vinegar available at any grocery store.

Once the vinegar has been poured into the radiator travel about 30 miles or 30 minutes so that the engine can get hot enough to dislodge any contaminants in the engine and radiator.

The next step is to drain the vinegar and rinse the system with clean water. The water should look clean when it flows from the petcock. Refill the cooling system with clean water and take another short trip. Drain the water again and rinse. Repeat the process until water runs clear. At this point you can fill the system with three gallons of water or if you choose a 50/50 mix of water and antifreeze.

Your cooling system is ready to go for another year.

Radiator Cleaning

Roger recommends adding 6 oz of Pine-Sol or Lestoil into a radiator full of fresh water. Drive the car about 12-15 miles, stop and take several folded up paper towels and swab around the bottom inside of the top tank and remove the grease buildup. Drive again for 10-12 miles and wipe again with paper towels. Repeat several more times as necessary until paper towels come out clean. When done, the inside of the top tank should shine like a new penny. Drain system and refill with fresh fluids.

Back Flush!

The cooling system on a Model A Ford can get pretty crudded up with rust, calcium, and also with grease from the water pump. If the radiator has been in service for a long time it is best to remove it and take it to a radiator shop (preferably to one that is knowledgeable of Model A radiators) and have it rodded out.

The engine block and the head are also usually crudded up, especially with rust. This is where a technique called back flushing can be affective. Back flushing of the radiator can also be affective if the cooling tubes are not hopelessly plugged up. The trick is to force water through the system backwards to the direction it normally flows.

Various cleaning solutions have been suggested for use in dislodging the cooling system crud. Some have suggested a combination of oxalic acid with a baking soda rinse. Others have suggested liquid Cascade dishwasher solution or vinegar. There are also commercial cooling system cleaning agents available from most auto parts stores.

Whatever cleaning agent is used, it is best to finish up by back flushing the system. It has also been suggested that a newly overhauled engine should be back flushed before being connected up to the radiator. A considerable amount of rust can become dislodged inside the water jackets when the engine was hot tanked and in all likelihood is still inside the water jackets, as well as machining chips. If the engine is immediately connected up to the radiator all the loose particles will be dumped into the radiator.

In order to back flush the Model A cooling system some special adapters need to be fabricated. Two plugs with a hole drilled in them must be made up, one to fit the large upper radiator hose, the other to fit the smaller lower radiator hose. The holes in the plugs should be tapped with a pipe thread. The plugs are then fitted to provide garden hose connections. The two plugs can be cut from steel or aluminum round stock. All the other hardware can be obtained from a local hardware store. Standard Model A radiator hoses and clamps are used to connect up the flushing apparatus.

To back flush the radiator, connect the adapters to the two radiator hose bibs. With a garden hose connected to the bottom hose bib adapter run water though the radiator backwards to the normal flow. Be sure to put the radiator cap on. A suggestion, connect the garden hose to your laundry machine hot water spigot and back flush with hot water. A second garden hose may be connected to the top radiator hose bib adapter to carry the exiting water to a suitable drain.

To back flush the engine, disconnect the radiator from the engine and install the two adapters to the engine. The large adapter is connected to the water outlet on top of the head. The small adapter is attached to the water inlet on the left side of the block. It is also suggested that the water pump be removed and a blanking plate be installed over the opening in the head. Connect a garden hose from the hot water spigot to the large adapter on top of the head. Connect a second hose to the smaller adapter on the side of the block and lead it off to a drain. Begin the back flushing. You can also start the engine up to add some vibration if desired. The

hot water will not only aid in flushing the engine, it will also prevent the possibility of cracking the block with the use of cold water if you run the engine. ©
